Getting Started

Training Requirement: A Third-Party Voter Registration Agent training course must be completed before conducting a registration drive. Training is offered by the county clerks and the Secretary of State. The state's manual for third party registration agents is here: bit!Ly/mmovetreagents

Notification and Registration Requirements: Civic organizations, employees, or volunteers conducting voter registration drives must register with the New Mexico Secretary of State (SOS) and submit a Voter Registration Agent identification Form, which includes all of the following:

- The names of officers of the organization and the name, telephone number, and permanent address of the organization;
- The names, permanent addresses, temporary addresses, if any, social security number, and dates of birth of each person registering persons to vote in New Mexico on behalf of the organization;
- A sworn statement from each registration agent employed by or volunteering for the organization stating that the agent will obey all state laws and rules regarding the registration of voters on a form that gives notice of the criminal penalties for false registration.

The form may be delivered by mail or fax to the Secretary of State or the county clerk.

All Voter Registration Agents (VRAs) will be issued a personal VRA number by the Secretary of State's office. The third party agent must carry and display a copy of the VRA Identification Form as proof of their credentials when assisting applicants with registering to vote. Compensation Restrictions: Do not pay registration drive participants based on how many registrations they collect. Do not offer an applicant any incentive of monetary value to register to vote.

State Form: A registered agent will receive a packet of 20 forms and may request, in person, another packet from the Secretary of State or county clerk. State forms include a receipt which must be given to voters upon their completion of the form.

If the Voter Registration Agent (VRA) provided substantial assistance to the registration applicant, then the VRA should put their name and VRA number in Item 10. VRAs must also record their VRA number in the receipt at the bottom of the registration form.

Logging Requirements: Finally, talk to the county clerk's office about their requirements for tracking and logging state voter registration forms. A link to a blank log page is available here:

It includes the unique identification number associated with each content of the politic point of the form upon completion by the registration agent took possession of the form upon completion by the registrant, and, if the third party voter registration agent took possession of the form upon completion by the registrant, the date the form was completed by the registrant. Completed logs must be produced when requesting additional blank voter registration forms from electrion officials.

Federal Form: Voter registration organizations may use the federal voter registration form:

Why are state-by-state guides important?

- Wide variation in state laws
- Some states have few or no restrictions
- Some have modest sets of rules
- Others, like Texas and Florida, have elaborate sets of rules and restrictions





What do the guides cover?

- Canvasser payment rules

Types of State rules



States that have a lot of rules and restrictions.

States that have moderate sets of rules around receiving forms, compensation, turnaround time, etc.

States with few or no rules on the books specific to community voter registration, e.g. compensation or prefilled forms only.

States that have documentary proof requirements to vote in some or all elections.

States with significant changes - Arizona

Conducting a Voter Registration Drive in Arizona

Voter Registration Deadline

On or before the 29th day before Election Day

If returned by mail, the registration must be: (1) postmarked by the deadline and received
by the County Recorder by 7.00 p.m. on Election Day; or (2) dated on or before the deadline
and received by the County Recorder no later than 5 days after the deadline.

Getting Started

Training Requirement: Arizona does not require training for registration drives.

Notification and Registration Requirements: Arizona does not require notification of a registration drive.

Compensation Restrictions: Do not pay registration drive participants based on how many registration forms they collect. Do not offer an applicant any incentive of monetary value to register to vote.

Obtaining Applications

Online Registration: Individuals with an Arizona driver license or ID card may register online using Service Arizona MVD: servicearizona.com/VoterRegistration/selectLanguage

Federal Form: The federal mail-in registration application may also be used in voter registration drives: eac.gov/voters/national-mail-voter-registration-form/

Photocopying Blank Forms: You may photocopy blank forms for use in voter registration drives.

Handling Applications

Incomplete Applications: No changes should be made or information added to a completed, signed registration application.

Photocopying Completed Applications: Arizona law does not expressly prohibit photocopying completed registration applications. As a best practice, a voter's full or partial Social Security number and/or driver's license number should not be retained.

Proof of Citizenship: Artiona also has a proof of citizenship requirement for registration to vote in state and local elections and to use the state voter registration form. Apolicants who do not provide documentary proof of citizenship with their Artiona states-secific voter registration form will be rejected. Providing an Artiona driver's license or state ID number issued after October

driver's license or state ID number issued after October 1, 1996, on either the state or federal voter registration form, fulfills the proof of citizenship requirement as long as the state finds the applicant's record. There is no need to provide anything more, unless the applicant's license or state ID was issued before the applicant became a U.S. citizen.

Applicants who don't have an Arizona driver's license or state ID issued after October 1, 1996 reflecting their current status as a U.S. citizen must provide documentary proof of citizenship to register to vote in state and local elections.

If the applicant does not have documentary proof of citizenship, they can still register to vote using the federal voter registration form to vote for president, vice president, and Congress.

States with significant changes - Florida

Conducting a Voter Registration Drive in Florida

Voter Registration Deadline

Applications must be received or postmarked 29 days before Election Day Drives must submit completed applications to the division or supervisor of the applicant's residence so they are received within 10 days of receiving them from the applicant or by the registration deadline, whichever is first.

Getting Started

Preregistration Filings: Before engaging in voter registration activities; third-party voter registration organizations must submit form DS-DE119 electronically to the Division of Elections at 3PVRD@dos.myflorida.com or if email is not available, by fax at 850-245-8291. Updates to staff canvassers (but not volunteers) are required within 10 days of the change.

 The form and other information is available online: dos.myflorida.com/elections/for-voters/voter-registration/third-party-voter-registration-organizations/

Organization ID: Third-party voter registration organizations may not begin collecting applications until the Division of Elections approves the application and assigns an ID number to the organization.

The organization ID, the date the application is collected from the applicat (MW/DO/YY), and the registration agent's initials must also be on each application collected during the registration on the bottom front portion of each voter registration application in a manner that does not obscure any other entry.

Compensation Restrictions: Do not pay registration drive participants based on how many registrations they collect. It is a felony offense in Florida to solicit or pay another person to solicit voter registration for compensation that is based on the number of registrations obtained.

Canvaser Restrictions: To collect or handle voter registration applications a person must not have been convicted of certain fedonies under Florida law. 39/W10 must affirm that their registration agents meet this requirement. State law sets fines of 550,000 per such agent collecting or handling applications who does not meet this requirement. Additional canvasier restrictions in Florida statute are currently not in effect due to a court order.

Canvaser Restrictions (cont'): "Collecting or handling" means physically exercising custed you will file dut vetter registration applications but does not include passing out blank applications, supervising the collecting or handling of applications, assisting a voter who requests assistance to file out their repostation application, or feditating the supervision of the collecting or handling SPARO may require each proof collecting or handling voter registration application on its behalf to sign written declarations affirming under penalty of perjury that the person has not been convicted of a lister felosy, if the SPARO has a declaration signed by the person with the conviction prior to collecting or handling veter.

States with significant changes - Louisiana

Conducting a Voter Registration Drive in Louisiana Voter Registration Deadline Paper applications must be received or postmarked by 30 days before Election Day. Online voter registration must be completed by 20 days before Election Day. If the deadline falls on a legal holiday, registration closes on the next day which is not a weekend day. States with significant changes -Missouri

Conducting a Voter Registration Drive in Missouri

Voter Registration Deadlines

Applications must be received or postmarked by the 4th Wednesday prior to Election Day. Voter registration drives turning in applications they collect must submit completed application forms within seven days of receipt.

Training Requirement: Missouri does not require training for registration drives. Local election authorities do provide

Notification and Registration Requirements: Any person who is paid or is otherwise compensated for collecting more than 10 voter registration applications in a general election cycle must complete the Voter Registration Solicitor Form and submit it to the Secretary of State's office. Any paid registration solicitor must be at least 18 years of age and registered to vote in Missouri each election cycle. Volunteers who are not compensated are not required to provide any information or notification to the Missouri. Secretary of State (SOS) or other election officials about their voter registration drive activities. Failure to complete the solicitor form, for those to whom it applies, is a punishable offense.

Compensation Ban: It is illegal in Missouri to compensate any person based on number of persons registered or number of voter registration applications collected. Do not offer an applicant any incentive of monetary value to register to vote. Additional regulrements exist in Missouri statute but are preliminarily enjoined and are currently the subject of ongoing litigation. Fair Elections Center cannot provide legal advice.

Obtaining Applications

State Form: You may download a state mail-in voter registration application from the SOS website, but the form information on a registration form unless you have express is county-specific so it's not recommended for voter registration drives. Pre-printed state applications can be requested from any election authority. Requests for a large number of applications should be made to the Secretary of State's office, 600 West Main Street, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65101, (573) 751-4936, info@sos.mo.gov.

Federal Form: The federal mail-in voter registration application may also be used in voter registration drives: eac.gov/voters/national-mail-voter-registration-form

The federal form should be mailed to the Secretary of State's office as listed on the federal form or the voter's local election authority. Find your local election authority

Photocopying Blank Forms: Blank applications may be photocopied and used in voter registration drives.



Handling Applications

Incomplete Applications: Do not fill in any missing nermission from the applicant

Photocopying Completed Applications: There is no law or rule prohibiting photocopying or retaining information from completed registration applications. As a best practice, a voter's full or partial Social Security number and/or the driver's license number should not be retained.

Submitting Applications: Anyone who offers to submit a completed voter registration application on another's behalf must deliver it within seven days of accepting or receiving the application. State regulations indicate state forms must be delivered to the appropriate election authority representing the area in which the applicant resides. Failure to deliver them within seven days is a
