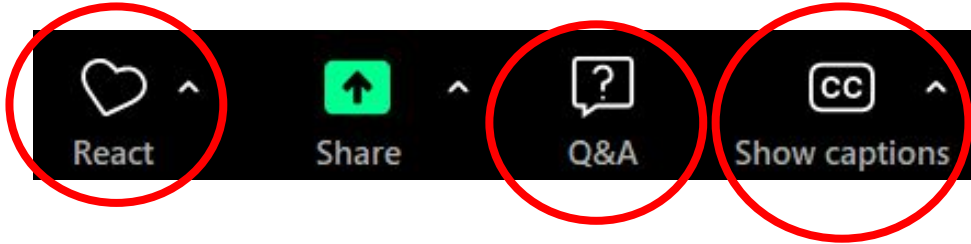

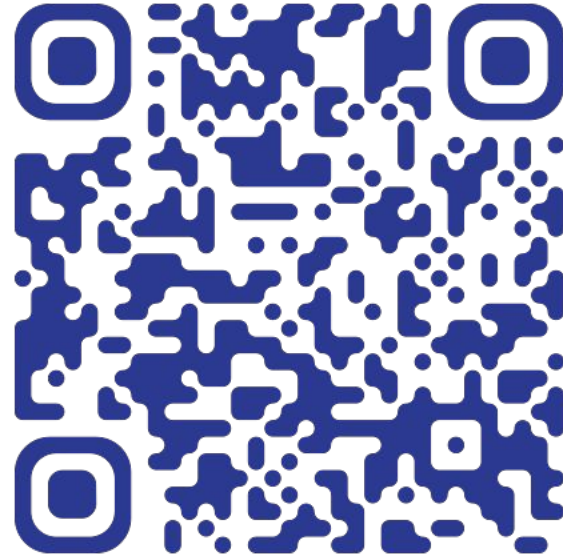

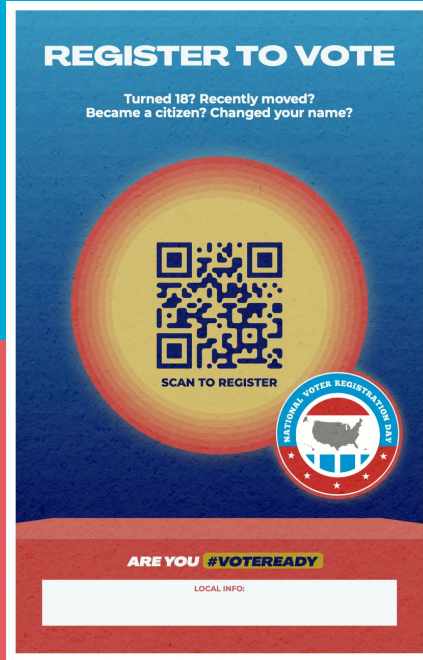


# What you can do as a **community partner**

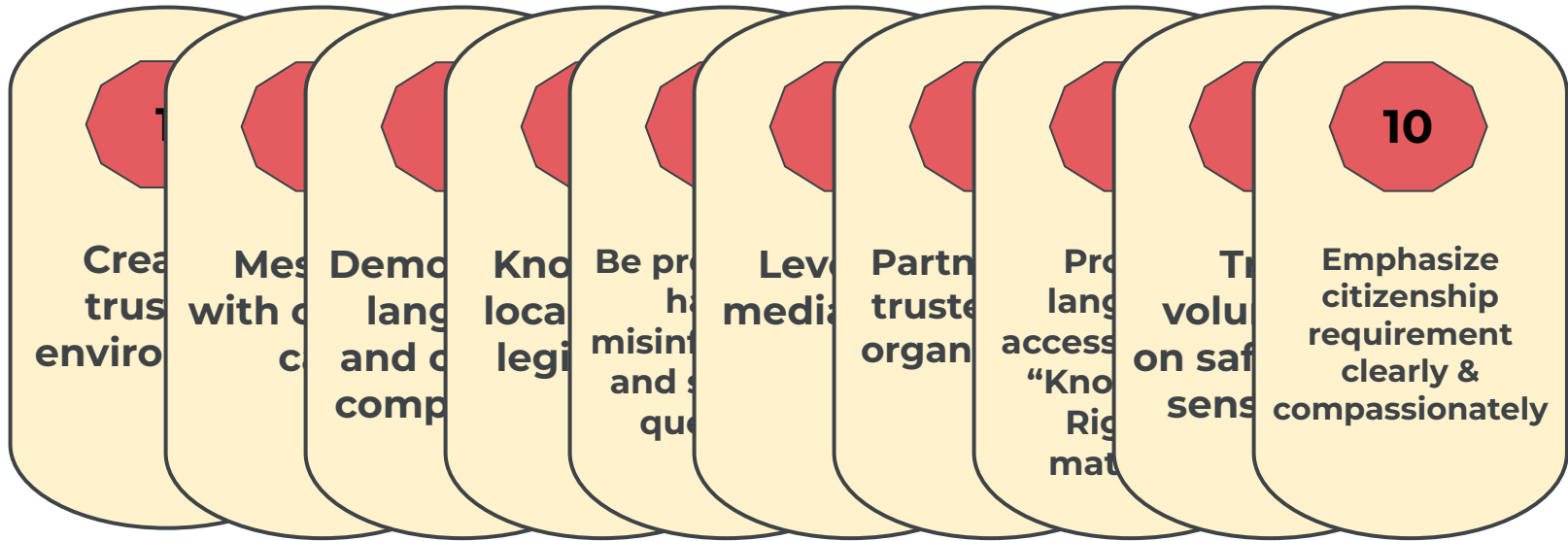

*"In 2012, a group of democracy-dedicated organizations and election officials put their heads together to answer a seemingly simple question: how can we ensure more eligible voters are registered to vote and ready to actively participate in our nation's democracy? The proposed solution: National Voter Registration Day."*

**What is National Voter Registration Day?**

Each year in the United States, millions of eligible voters find themselves unable to vote because of easily prevented issues like missing a registration deadline, forgetting to update their registration after a name change or moving, or simply because they aren't sure how to register.

National Voter Registration Day was created in 2012 to help address such issues by serving as a nationwide nonpartisan rallying point to promote voter registration and help eligible voters across the country get #VoteReady to participate in our shared democracy. Since 2012, more than 5 million citizens have registered to vote on the annual holiday, including a record-breaking 1.5 million in 2020 alone.

**This year's holiday is September 17, 2024!**

On September 19, thousands of partners ranging from local libraries and college campuses to national nonprofits, Fortune 500 companies, Silicon Valley tech giants, and more will join forces for a single day of star-spangled awesomeness, celebrating our democracy and the voting public that makes it possible. Through a coordinated nationwide civic blitz in traditional media, online, and good old-fashioned face-to-face voter engagement in communities across the country, we'll spend 24 hours driving unparalleled awareness of voter registration opportunities to millions who may not otherwise register.

Far from just the presidential contest, 2024 will bring elections for 34 US Senate seats, 435 House of Representatives seats, state legislative races across 48 states, 11 governors races, alongside scores of municipal races, ballot initiatives, and more. Paving the way for the first presidential election since 2020 when NVRD got over 1.5 million Americans registered to vote, 2024 is on track to be one massive year for voter engagement.

**WHAT IS NATIONAL VOTER REGISTRATION DAY?**

National Voter Registration Day is a nonpartisan civic holiday celebrating democracy by getting every eligible American registered to vote. It was first observed in 2012 and has quickly become a national celebration that has registered **over 6 million Americans** in its lifetime. Volunteers and organizations **nationwide** hit the streets to register voters in front of libraries, school campuses, and other social events.

**WHERE SHOULD STUDENTS REGISTER?**

College students attending college out-of-state have dual residency in both their home state and the state where their school is, but they can only be registered to vote in one state. The rules in each state vary, so your first step is to check out the **ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge** and **College Central** websites for information on how to help students make the right choice for them.

**WHY SHOULD COLLEGES PARTICIPATE?**

All across the year, Americans have been showing up at the polls to cast their ballots in local elections. If your state has a primary or general election coming up this fall, let's keep the momentum going as many college students will be registering to vote and voting for the first time this year. As the future lifeblood of our democracy, GenZ makes up a vitally important block of the electorate. Yet as a population, they often show some of the **lowest registration** and turnout rates by age-group. **So what gives?**

It might be hard to square with the trope of the politically engaged student activist, but many of these young Americans are **entering our electoral process for the first time** during a very busy period of life that's full of big changes, and would already benefit from voter education on the registration and voting process. They also **benefit from information** about specific questions relevant to college voters, like whether to register to vote in their home state or their campus address.

That's where you come in: the campus environment is the **perfect** place to get **students** with so many opportunities to encourage students to get registered and engage their peers. And what better way to turn your campus into a hotbed of enthusiastic voter engagement than taking part in the celebration that is National Voter Registration Day? By joining this nationwide day of action on September 16th, you can help our democracy close the participation gap among college students, help students exercise their voting power, and shape the future of our democracy.

# Voter Engagement Timeline through NVRD

For nonprofits and community organizations



## 6+ MONTHS OUT

- Designate a Staff Lead (An internal champion who will coordinate voter engagement efforts)
- Establish buy-in and support from your Executive Director and senior staff
- Create a voter engagement plan, including goals and timeline
- Review the voting and deadlines in your state
- Identify potential partners to help provide training or resources
- Meet with your local election office to establish a relationship
- Develop a system for returning completed voter registration forms



# Voter Engagement Timeline through NVRD

## 5 MONTHS OUT

- Gather materials and resources to raise program visibility and engage voters (e.g. posters, buttons, and flyers)
- Train and motivate staff and volunteers who will interact with voters
- Kick off your voter engagement programs

## 4 MONTHS OUT

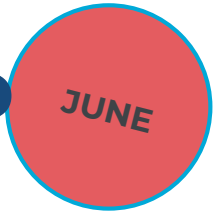
- Continue voter registration efforts

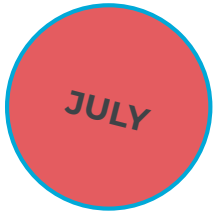

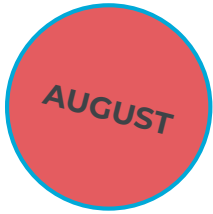

# Voter Engagement Timeline through NVRD

## For nonprofits and community organizations



### 1 MONTH OUT

- Continue intensive voter registration and voter pledge efforts through your state's voter registration deadline
- Do get-out-the-vote and voter education activities, primarily during the final 2-3 weeks before NVRD
- Start hanging your NVRD posters around your community
- Begin promoting early voting and vote-by-mail opportunities
- Identify and prepare staff who can answer voting questions

### 0 MONTHS OUT

- Finalize your voter drive logistics and details. Do a test run.
- Familiarize yourself with your voting legislation by visiting your local election office's website.
- Run your voter drive on September 15th!
- Continue preparing for GOTV.

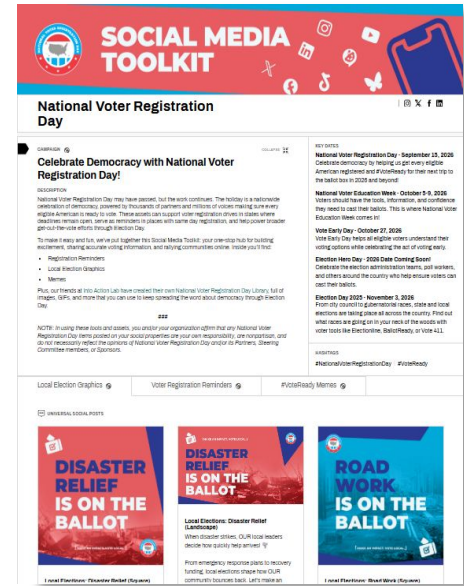
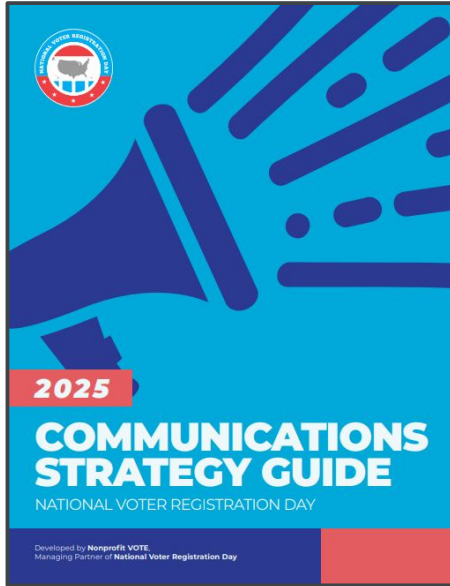

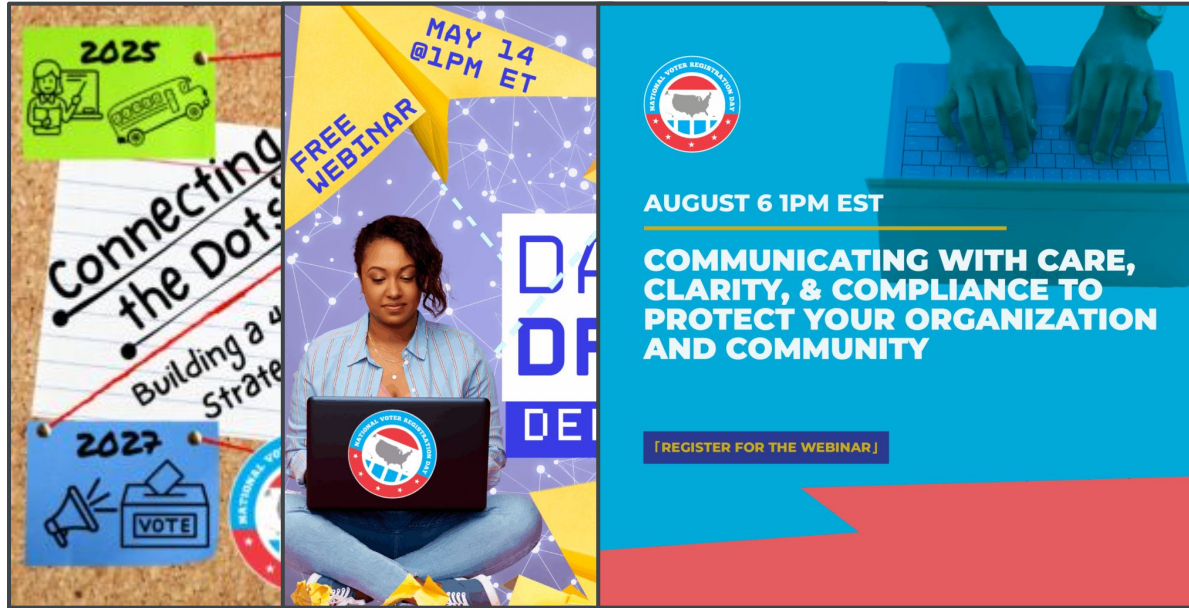

Check the local newspaper or call your clerk's office for the date and time of such meeting.</li> <li><b>Register at your polling place on Election Day.</b> All voters must show proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile, which must be satisfied with documents.</li> </ul> <p>See the following for the state's guide to voter registration: <a href="https://www.elections.nh.gov/voter-registration/">https://www.elections.nh.gov/voter-registration/</a></p> <p>An individual is eligible to vote if they are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>At least 18 years old by Election Day</li> <li>A U.S. citizen</li> <li>Domiciled in the city or town where the person is registering to vote (there is no minimum period of time required to have lived in the state to establish domicile for voter registration).</li> </ul> <p>Proof can be satisfied in the following ways:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A driver's license or non-driver ID from any state satisfies proof of identity and age</li> <li>A birth certificate, U.S. Passport card, or naturalization document satisfies proof of citizenship</li> <li>Proof of Domicile:             <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If you have it you must provide one of:                     <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Driver's license or other New Hampshire ID card issued by New Hampshire DMV showing your current domicile address</li> <li>New Hampshire resident vehicle registration if the listed address matches the domicile address on your voter registration form</li> <li>Photo ID issued by the US government that contains a current address.</li> <li>Government issued check, benefit statement, or tax document with a current address.</li> </ul> </li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p>If the voter does not have any of those forms, they may provide any reasonable documentation showing that the person is domiciled in the city or town in which they wish to register, along with completing a form attesting they do not have the above forms of proof of domicile.</p> <p>Other reasonable documentation can include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A document from the school the student attends showing they live in campus housing, including showing the election official a page from the institution's official site showing the dorm assignment or off-campus residence address</li> <li>A rental agreement, lease, or similar document that shows the voter's name and the address of the domicile</li> <li>A public utility bill showing the voter's name and domicile address on it.</li> <li>Any state or federal tax form, other government form, or government ID that shows your name and domicile address.</li> </ul> <p><b>OBTAINING APPLICATIONS</b></p> <p>Applications to register to vote must be obtained from the town or city clerk's office.</p> <p>Please note that New Hampshire town and city clerks will only accept the federal form as a request for the state's absentee voter mail-in registration form.
